MARK MY WORDS



It's hard to believe that the month of May will be upon us by the time you read this. Today in my little corner of the world (in mid-April), the temperature is expected to soar into the upper 80s, perhaps even into the 90s. The fact that I was receiving dangerously low temperature and frost warnings for tender plants from the National Weather Service just a week ago makes things that much more bizarre. And who knows – as you read this, the temperature could well be anywhere from thirty degrees to a hundred!

What I do know is that we are well into Spring at this point in the calendar by nearly anyone's reckoning. If the trees and flowers are more than a little confused, who can blame them? May is remarkable for many things, not the least of which is the celebration of new life and regrowth. In fact, according to one widely accepted story, March was named for *Maia*, the Roman goddess of spring and growth. Her name, in turn, related to a Latin word that means increase or growth.

May is a month of numerous holidays, including *Cinco de Mayo* (May 5), *Mothers Day* (the second Sunday in May), *Armed Forces Day* (the third Saturday in May), and of course, *Memorial Day* (the last Monday in May). The first weekend in May (5th and 6th) marks your last chance to take advantage of the native perennial plant sale held in the side yard of the UUCLV between 9 am and 3 pm. It also affords us – as a congregation – the chance to welcome the newest members of the church at a New Member Book Signing during the worship service on Sunday, May 20th.

To any of you who may still not have made a commitment of time, talent and treasure to the church for the coming year, I urge you to do so as soon as possible. There are a great many things in our world that cry out for our attention and involvement – from sheltering the homeless to advocating for social justice, from working toward a greener, more responsible approach to using our finite natural resources to defending everyone's right to worship (*or not worship*) according to their own conscience. If we are to continue to be a strong, effective voice of liberal religion in the Lehigh Valley and beyond, ours should, indeed **must be** a sustained and mutually cooperative effort.

While support of the church extends far beyond the monetary, it would be foolish to pretend that the UUCLV's financial needs are nothing to worry about. Our staff compensation, facility expenses and denominational support are serious and substantial ongoing obligations to which we've committed ourselves. They are certainly not the sole – or even the primary – reason to give of yourself or your funds to this church, but honoring them remains critical if we are to serve the needs of our members and friends, as well as the broader community and issues which ignite our passion.

CORE MISSION TASK FORCE

The Core Mission Task Force has completed analyzing the results of the April 1 Congregational meeting's answers to the question, "What is our church for?" The three primary answers were: 1. A summary of our income and expenses through March 2012 is as follows:

We're three-quarters through our 2011-12 church fiscal year, and we're still "in the black". Total income and pledge payments are still ahead of budget, but we need people to stay current and complete their pledge payments by the end of the year on June 30. Thanks to those who have already completed their pledge payments for the year.

Total expenses are pretty close to the budgeted amount. Religious Education expense, as indicated, is running a little less than budgeted. We've been frugal on the expense side of our ledger and need to remain so, since the net operating income is expected to shrink quickly as we approach the end of the year. A complete Treasurer's Report is available on the church website.

We're in the process of developing our budget for the 2012-12 church year. We have a number of financial challenges, mostly due to the closing of Gateway School, the largest renter of our church facilities.

Therefore, it is important that everyone makes a pledge to support our operating budget for next year. Thanks to those who have done so; but if you haven't please do so ASAP by using the form on the web or by seeing one of the Stewardship Committee during social hour at church.

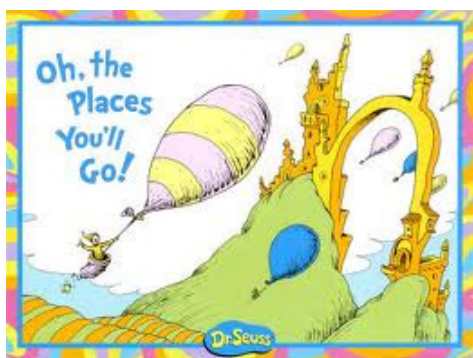

SUMMER CURRICULUM – Dr. Seuss and Unitarian Universalists

When my daughter was old enough to be read to, Dr. Seuss quickly became a staple in our regular bedtime routine. Starting with *the Cat in the Hat* and *Mr. Brown Can Moo, Can You?*, we progressed up to the more involved stories like *McElligot's Pool* and *Oh the Places You'll Go*. As I read these stories, I discovered that the illustrations had been etched in my mind as a youngster. Each time I turned a page from a book I hadn't seen in thirty five years, I was stunned. It was like having a childhood pet come back to life right there in my lap.



What is your favorite Dr Seuss story? Is it *How the Grinch Stole Christmas*, or *Batholomew and the Oobleck*, or *On Beyond Zebra*? I think most Americans have a favorite. What other author can you say that about her or him? Dr. Seuss' influence on children's reading is beyond measure. That tall, red and white-striped hat is synonymous with children's reading. Since so many schools and libraries promote Dr. Seuss so heavily, why also do it in Sunday school? Dr Seuss taught more than reading. He wove into his stories themes such as friendship, loyalty, responsibility, curiosity and care of the earth. Every Seuss book can be linked with one of our seven principles. Helen Zidawicki, who wrote the UU Alphabet curriculum in use in our PreK/K class, also wrote Dr Seuss and UU's. It is all available on line and is well organized and flexible, so class preparation is quite simple. The books are available from members or at the Bethlehem library.

I invite you to volunteer for one class this summer to read and discuss one Seuss story with our primary and elementary children. A signup sheet will be available at the RE welcome table in the community room after

services, or you can send an e-mail to me at lec@uucvpa.org. This is a perfect opportunity to contribute to children's religious education, especially if you can't make a bigger commitment to the program during the regular church year. The coordinator or an RE committee member will be there every Sunday to assist with classroom management. Thank you in advance.

“Please take out the insert in your order of service; I invite you to notice the list of characteristics and styles that may expand your definition of “giftedness” and begin to suggest ways that you might find the intersection between your own “deep gladness and the world’s deep need”. While surely I’d like to have one of these forms back from each of you, just as surely I’d like to sit down and talk to you about the form of volunteer ministry you feel called to do.”

In the service on March 11, I asked each of you to fill out the UUCLV Shared Ministry Survey that came with each order of service. If you weren’t here, you can play too! Just ask me, and I’ll give you a copy of the survey—and don’t forget to **talk** to me about the forms. They shouldn’t be viewed as another collection of data any more than you should be!

Part of the value of membership in any church is the way parts of you are “called out” and developed. Church should equip you to live more meaningfully outside of church. In another denomination, members might be exhorted to be “doers of the Word”. Translated into UU-speak, all that really means is living out your Unitarian Universalist values.

“I want to know how to help you do ministry in your church and be the most powerful Unitarian Universalist you can be in all the areas of your life.”

This month, I invite you to consider what areas of your life are “called out”, maybe you would say, “where do I feel the need to give service?” Marlene Wilson, author of *How to Mobilize Church Volunteers*, writes about the differences between self-righteous or self-serving service and what she calls true service. *Self-righteous* service enjoys “big deal”, self-aggrandizing service, expects applause for the work, is highly concerned with results and reciprocation, picks and chooses whom to serve, and is affected by moods and whims. *True service*, on the other hand, welcomes both small and large service, doesn’t need recognition (but isn’t averse to it), loves to serve for the sake of the giving,

serves anyone with a need and doesn’t stop serving because they aren’t in the mood.

You may have seen both of these kinds of service in many areas of your life. As you move through your various volunteer ministries inside the church and outside of it, notice when you feel that you are living your Unitarian Universalist values. And please, talk to your fellow congregants about it. Talk to me about it too!

JUSTICE GA

June 20-24, Phoenix, AZ

It may seem early for GA, but the best time to reserve housing is by March 1.

There will be something for everyone at this GA, no matter where you may be in the spectrum of social justice work. Whether you're a seasoned activist or a beginner, there will be educational and preparatory programming and other opportunities for you to have meaningful involvement.

There will be community events outside as well as work done indoors. Phoenix will be hot, but you will be able to limit your exposure. GA housing is very close to the Phoenix Convention Center, and there are many food options within the Center. There will be an exhibit hall - the Justice GA Expo - with social justice exhibitors and resources. GA programming will be focused on justice issues, including topics such as the spiritual foundations of justice work, the theology of social justice, as well as a more tactical focus on organizing.
