#### Our Theme for March: What Does It Mean to Be Community of Risk?

#### To act is to be committed, and to be committed is to be in danger. ~James Baldwin

Risk is usually associated with the dare devils and thrill seekers. The real danger, we're told, is a life of boredom. The battle is between the bland and the bold.

Yet, as James Baldwin reminds us, it's not quite that simple. He places commitment, not thrills, at the center of the game. For him, the ones to be admired are not so much the dare devils as the dedicated ones. And that Holy Grail? Well, he sug-gests, maybe it's not "the exciting life' as we've been told. Maybe it's the faithful life.

And that turns everything wonderfully on its head.

From this perspective, the important question about risk (and about life) is not "Are you willing to jump off?" but "Are you willing to jump in?" Not "Are you willing to put yourself in danger?" but "Are you willing to give yourself to something bigger?" Not "Will you be daring?" but "Will you stay true?"

And the message changes too. Suddenly, it's not "Run to what's thrilling!" but "Don't run away!"

It's all about remembering not to let the thrilling trump the faithful. As exciting as roller coasters and jumping out of planes might be, let's remember to remind each other that the most deeply rewarding risks are the ones that involve jumping into causes and putting our hearts in the hands of others. As the poet David Whyte puts it: "We are here essentially to risk ourselves in the world. We are meant to hazard ourselves for the right thing, for the right woman or the right man, for a son or a daughter, for the right work or for a gift given against all the odds." Bob Marley's take is equally compelling. He writes, "The truth is, everyone is going to hurt you. You just got to find the ones worth suffering for."

And here's the twist: It's not just Baldwin's dangers, Whyte's hazards and Marley's suffering that come at us when we take the risk of living faithfully. Grace and gifts slip in there too! As the Scottish writer W.H. Murray explains, *(continued Page 2)*

## KEEPING OUR BELOVED COMMUNITY SAFE...

#### A REQUEST TO THE CONGREGATION

Our church is more than a Sunday venue, it is in use every day of the week. We have long-term tenants and one-time rentals as well as numerous meetings, day and night. One of our long-term tenants is Head Start, a preschool program.

It is important that we maintain building security not only for the children we host, but for all of us. Our building has many entryways, and we do not have 24/7 security. Many congregants and tenants have the codes for opening lockboxes and accessing the areas they need to use. That is both necessary and risky. It is not unusual to find the Wall St. door unlocked when staff arrive in the morning.

Recently, there was a major theft from a room on the 3rd floor that George Miller uses as his studio. Someone unlocked the door, and stole his specialty woodworking and jewelry making tools. Unfortunately, the open door and theft went undetected/for over a week.

One thing we can all do is to be aware of any unusual activity or unlocked doors. Folks who open the building for meetings should lock the access door (usually Wall St.) when their attendees have arrived, so no one slips into the building. The double doors on the 2nd and 3rd floor hallways should remain locked; there are bells to signal the rooms when someone needs entry.

Please be aware and alert: if you *see* something, *say* something. Fill out an Incident Report Form. Call or text the office, if you think someone is in the building is unauthorized, or call the Bethlehem Police. We don't want harm to come to anyone who uses our facility.

## NEWS UPDATE FROM THE UUCLV TRANSFORMATIONAL PLANNING TEAM

On February 4, 8 members of our church, including members of the Board and Transformational Planning Team, went to the UU church in Lancaster for a Strategic Board Workshop sponsored by the Central East Region and conducted by the Rev. David Pyle. Among other things, we discussed cultural v. structural change in our congregations, different models for church governance, vision and mission discernment, and the tasks of strategic boards. We are using these tools to broaden our understanding of the kind of culture and structure that can best support us as we plan and work towards a strengthened vision and mission for the UUCLV.
