May: What Does It Mean to Be a People of Creativity?

Creativity is our ability to dream things up and make them happen.

We're all familiar with that part in the quote about dreaming. Conjuring up new ideas and images is what creativity is all about. Using the building blocks of "what is," we – almost magically – make the "not yet" appear in our minds.

But what about that other part? The part about "making them happen." When we talk about creativity, that half of the equation often gets short shrift. We celebrate the fun piece about dreaming and leave off the hard piece of making our imaginings real. But, as Thoreau said, "If you have built castles in the air, your work need not be lost; that is where they should be. Now put the foundations under them."

Well, we've sure gotten a great start on the "imagination" part. We enjoyed a well-attended church-wide retreat following our April 22 worship service, sitting around tables in the Community Room. First, we shared a light lunch and fellowship. Next, we engaged in some real visioning work, led by our consultant, Mark Bernstein, supported by the leadership of our Action Planning Team.

The first item on the agenda was to explore the question, "Why do we exist?" or, "What is the ultimate purpose of our church?" This gave rise to some vigorous conversations. Then we took turns sharing each table's ideas with the group.

Then we sorted ourselves into new groups to explore our five top priorities for exploring our spiritual yearnings and dreams for UUCLV. This was inspirational, provocative, and even practical as we considered how we might implement our focus on the top five items from our recent congregational survey.

We took turns exploring questions of creating engaging and stirring worship services; broad inclusiveness, creative outreach, and radical hospitality; Beloved Community; action to advocate for peace/nonviolence, social and economic justice, and the environment; and how we could provide more diverse opportunities for spiritual growth.

This was a great experience, but just the beginning as our Action Planning Team continues the creative work of discerning our future.

Thanks to the team, and thanks to all of you, too! See you in church.

FROM THE PRESIDENT



FOLLOW UP

By the time you read this, we'll have had our congregational retreat, most everyone will have read the survey summary prepared by Janice Lovegrove and the Action Planning team will be digesting the results of the survey and your input towards developing a plan to make us a welcoming congregation.

Before I get into my take on this process, I want to thank Janice for the yeoman work she has put into this whole planning process over the last two years. Much of where we are today is due to her efforts. Also my thanks to Sharon Beckhard, Barbara Diamant and Tom Zimmerman for their work compiling the information on Survey Monkey and Janice for her summary. The survey says a lot about us. It points out our several shortcomings and opportunities for improvement.

The most important issue is outlined on Page 11, under, "Overview of our Respondents". As I read through this section it is apparent that we are an "aging" congregation. 70% of the respondents are over 60 years old and only 6 % are under the age of 40. The dichotomy can't be sustained for very much longer. Bottom Line: We must increase our efforts on making our congregation more welcoming so that younger families will want to join us. This will be the biggest challenge for the Action Planning Team because it involves changing many of our cherished past practices.

One of these practices, as outlined in the survey, is that we are somewhat self-centered, i.e. not a truly open community. One-quarter of respondents are not satisfied with UUCLV as a congregation and one-third would not enthusiastically recommend us to a friend. And, finally, one-quarter have considered leaving our congregation in the last year. These figures point up areas that need to be investigated and addressed before we can realistically expect an influx of new people.

Even though the survey shows we have many differing beliefs, we all want from our congregation a sense of community, a welcoming community that we can all be proud of and where we want to invite new people to join us, to share our values and help us grow. My hope is that we all will help obtain this goal. It will be up to all of us.

And, as I've noted before, join a committee and have some fun. **- Cease**

THE CENTER & WALL STREET JOURNAL

This summarizes our financial situation as of March 31, 2018, three-quarters of the way through the current fiscal year (July 2017 through June 2018).

Compared to recent history:

- Pledge income is slightly higher than expected
- Total income is about as expected
- Expense is more than 5% higher than expected
- Net income is positive, but significantly lower than expected.

Selected specifics are tabulated below.

A significant amount of bequest money (received last quarter, as reported) remains in our savings account, to be expended or allocated as directed by the Board.

Consequently, cash flow remains very robust.

Through the end of March we spent approximately \$132,000 on the nearly-completed elevator project. The remaining capital funds are expected to suffice to pay for the elevator when completed.

If you have not done so, please consider fulfilling your pledge for 2017-18, or even "paying ahead" for 2018-19. If you're uncertain about your remaining pledge "balance," please contact me or Assistant Treasurer Don Davis.

FROM THE LIFESPAN EDUCATION COORDINATOR

SPEAKING WITH YOUR CHILD ABOUT VIOLENCE IN THE NEWS

How do we talk to our children about the violent events and political turmoil we face in the news these days?

There is so much continuous, often graphic coverage of violent events, we can't completely shield our children from it. How do we help them deal with the fear and anxiety? I wish I could say I have lots of sage advice about this, but I was not very proactive when I was raising my daughter. At age three in 1999, she was probably too young to be aware of Columbine, but as a five-year old, 9/11 was impossible to ignore. I don't remember what my wife Elisa and my conversations with her consisted of – I don't think we were very intentional about it. We did a few things that I'm sure helped. We lit candles at dinner time and attended prayer and candlelight vigils. Months later, we protested the administration's plans to go to war in Iraq by joining Elisa's synagogue's march in Washington DC.

These days, traumatic events seem to happen every couple of months. It is important to listen to our children for signs of trauma, fear or anxiety. Encourage them to ask questions. It is also important to take age into account when forming your response. Don't give a more complicated answer than you need to. The UUA web site has a lot of useful information about these issues at this address: <https://www.uua.org/families/disaster/responding-to-trauma>.

You can also go to the home page at www.uua.org, click on [Ages and Stages](#) in the upper right corner, then click [Families](#). Look for the tab [Hate, Violence & Trauma](#) on the left menu. You will find a lot of articles, blog posts, etc. with related material. One helpful article is from Mental Health America (MHA), titled [Helping Children Cope with Tragedy Related Anxiety](#). The advice differs by age.

Here is a general set of tips from MHAP:

- Children need comforting and frequent reassurance that they're safe. Make sure they get it.
- Be honest and open about the tragedy or disaster.
- Encourage children to express their feelings through talking, drawing or playing.
- Try to maintain daily routines as much as possible.

An issue was raised last month about how we talk about violence and politics during our joys and sorrows ceremony, especially on multi-generational Sundays. A couple of times recently, joys and sorrows became more explicit or graphic than is appropriate for young children. Please be mindful that children may be present and share your feelings without using graphic language.

PASTORAL CARE UPDATE

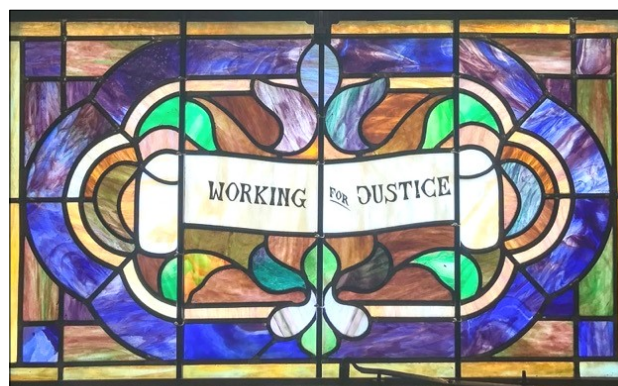
As a community, we make a commitment to be there for one another when things don't always go as planned. One of the ways we fill this commitment is through Pastoral Care.
