It's not the call I was expecting. Kaaren, my wife, was taking her dad on one of his first trips for chemo treatment. The day started off anxious, heavy, sad. This kind of thing is hard stuff. I asked her to check in mid-day to let me know how things were going. She called a bit after lunch. I said hello. There was silence on the other end of the phone. She couldn't speak. It was clear she was trying to find her breath. I worried. Then... she laughed! Couldn't stop laughing actually.

In between gasps of laughter, she explained: "We...[deep breath]... are... [deep breath]... reading... David... Sedaris... The... one... about... him... not... being... able... to... flush... the... toilet... at... the... fancy... dinner... party... and... not... being... able... to... leave... the... restroom... because... of... it!"

Ok, that's all I am going to give you. Leave it to say that David Sadaris is one of the funniest writers you will ever read. "Milk out your nose funny," as one of my friends says. "I know it's gross," Kaaren went on, "but we don't care. We've been laughing for a half hour straight! And, god, does it feel good to laugh together."

God, does it feel good to laugh together. Amen to that. Especially in the midst of pain, worry or fear.

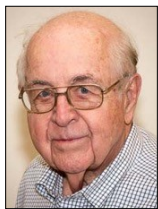
Kaaren and I talked about it later. "I love laughing with my dad," she said. "I just feel so close to him when we are laughing." But she also talked about distance. And how laughter somehow helps us step back--get a slightly different view. There's nothing funny about cancer, but the laughter helped them see that the cancer isn't the only thing there. In addition to the illness, there's also a daughter who loves her father very much. And a father that loves his daughter very much. And they enjoy each other. Which is no small thing. And they get some more days to laugh and connect. Which is also no small thing. Laughter says look at that. Laughter says, how dare you let that gift out of your sight!

The Start of a New Year

Our coming year is full of very interesting and challenging opportunities. Some of them include:

Our New Web Site – Eric Lee has spent many, many hours developing our new

site. The website is the 'Front Door' to our church. Take a look at www.uuclvpa.org/wp/.

Planning for the Future – The Transformational Planning Team, who initiated our drive towards becoming a "Healthy Congregation", has now relinquished ongoing activities to the Church Planning Committee. Initial committee activities will be to conduct a congregational survey, to develop small group ministries, and to contact and visit growing UU churches to learn from thriving congregations. Committee recommendations will be reviewed by the Board for implementation. UU consultant Mark Bernstein, who is already familiar with our church will assist our efforts.

The Board Of Trustees – In the past, our Board has spent much of its time on church operational issues and not on strategic planning. In the future, most of the issues associated with church operations will be handled by the Program Council. The Board will concentrate on developing policies and procedures for running the church and future planning, such as where we want to be in 5 years and how we get there.

The Program Council – We are working to make the P.C. responsible for church operations. I hope that, eventually, the P.C. will relieve the Board of all routine operational responsibilities.

We will soon have charters for each committee. The key reasons for the charters are to eliminate overlaps or gaps in church functions and to provide new chairs with a guideline for operating the committees.

We have so many committees that we often can't find enough people to fill the vacancies. A joint task force of Board and P.C. will be formed to address the problem.

I hope that each of you will consider joining a committee and help us run our beloved church. My deepest appreciation to all of our volunteers. You make our church the vibrant place which we all love.

There's some exciting times ahead. Come join in the fun!

HANDICAPPED ACCESS ELEVATOR PROJECT TO PROCEED

At the May meeting, the UUCLV Board approved a proposal from the Capital Projects Committee to build a Limited Use/Limited Access (LULA) elevator to provide handicapped accessibility to three levels of the church: the Community Room, the Sanctuary, and the RE/Administrative level. The proposed solution also provides the capability to offer access to the gym level when funds are available.

A LULA is a hybrid between and full-sized commercial elevator and a wheelchair lift. It looks and rides like a standard elevator. The sole purpose of a LULA is to provide barrier-free access.

The cost of the project is estimated at approximately \$194,000. The amount of capital funding currently available is \$157,000, which includes a \$20,000 Chalice Lighter grant from Joseph Priestly District. The Finance Committee and Board approved a supplemental capital fund raising campaign to raise additional funds to address the shortfall.

The project is expected to start in late summer and take approximately four weeks to complete.

ANNUAL MEETING FOR THE CONFERENCE OF CHURCHES

Elizabeth Johnson attended the June 2 Annual Meeting of the Lehigh Conference of Churches in Allentown, representing the UUCLV. Members approved a \$5.3 million budget for 2017-18 with programs projected to cost \$2.5 million with \$2.6 million in revenue from Lehigh County and \$1 million in Federal funds, among other funding mechanism.

In February, the Conference, serving the poor in Lehigh County, opened a Bethlehem office to serve Northampton County residents in need of low income housing. Another achievement, saluted by Rev. Larry D. Pickens, ecumenical director, was the writing of an interfaith statement against bullying in response to incidents of intolerance in area high schools. The statement was a collaboration of religious leaders in the membership. Dr. Jack Felch, executive director, reported on plans for savings in the Lazarus Houses program which serves released prisoners with housing for which they pay.

UUCLV, due to its shared plate donation, is among 2016-17 member organizations listed in the report.


Growing UU Faith in Annapolis

A LITTLE ABOUT A LOT - THE UU SERVICE COMMITTEE

The social conscience “heavy lifter” of the UU Association is the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC), founded in 1939 by Rev. Waitstill Sharp and his wife Martha Sharp, who were sponsored by the American Unitarian Association to help refugees flee Nazi persecution.

Today, the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) is a nonsectarian human rights organization powered by grassroots collaboration. UUSC has roughly 40 staff members and projects in 8 countries (some have more than one). They work anywhere rights are threatened – by natural disasters, armed conflicts, genocide, forced migration, and systematic injustice.

From providing maternal and child health and family planning in Haiti to working to pass Human Right to Water legislation in the US, you will be amazed at the accomplishments of the UUSC! We hope you'll take a minute to read about all of them at <http://www.uusc.org/about-uusc/>.

UUSC's work around the world is guided by the values of Unitarian Universalism and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which you can find out more about by stopping by the Social Action Table during Coffee Hour.

At the UUCLV, the UUSC has been visible in varying degrees throughout the years. The Social Action Committee is currently reviewing UUSC's work with an eye to making it more visible to UUCLV members. More to come in future months!
