What's Old Is New Again

It's now the height of summer vacation – sunshine, rain showers, beach and mountain explorations. In the midst of all this, I remember just how wonderful and miraculous summer vacations seemed when I was a child. Two-and-a-half whole months without school! What an incredible gift that was. I can now recognize just how much that youthful view of summer vacation still affects how I experience things to this day. The overwhelming message is that summer is a special time for experiencing life with neither discipline or order – a child's dream come true.

Sometimes the past returns as memory, sometimes as nostalgia. Sometimes it returns as a judgment, other times it returns in the form of a long-forgotten memory of trust and hope. This month, I've found myself reflecting on a series of three sermons I delivered over five years ago as we began the process of what turned out to be our congregational statement of core values: "We are a compassionate community, nurturing personal growth and working for justice."

Those sermons formed the theoretical basis for that group process and I think most were pleased with the result. But as we continue the adventure of what's been called "transformational planning," we're about to encounter some of these ideas in a new form. This September we'll begin an exploration of "transformational worship" as one of the next stages in our journey together.

I think it would be a great idea to revisit these sermons from the past, "What Is Religion For?" "What Is Church For?" and "What Is This Church For?" as an introduction to our next steps together. They'll be updated and revised, of course, but the questions endure. Five years ago, they may have provided signposts for our quest for core values, but they may be even more relevant now as we begin to ask, "What is it that church asks of us?"

If you read this Link and the recent e-news, the congregation (through the Board) has approved the UUA Declaration of Conscience and charges the congregation to get involved as much as possible concerning these principles. With a federal government's lack of concern for basic human rights, we need to do whatever possible to redirect these concerns. Please read and sign this Declaration and do whatever you can to correct these injustices.

The Board is also working on several financial policies which will set our future financial path and has established a Church Visit Taskforce to visit two or more successful UU churches to find out how they have become so successful and see if we can learn from them.

August 6 Archetypes

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE) FOR CHILDREN & YOUTH

The Religious Education Committee met for our summer retreat on July 16th. We reviewed our covenant, mission statement and charter. We picked dates for a few important events and most important, reviewed our progress in recruiting teachers and assistants for the fall. To fully staff all the classes so that no volunteer has to commit to more than 2 Sundays a month, we need about 30 teachers, assistants and advisors. As of this article, every class has at least two lead teachers and some have additional helpers. We are about two thirds of the way there, so if we get just ten more volunteers, the workload will be greatly reduced for everyone. If you have never taught, you don't know what you are missing. Our children and youth are friendly, considerate, thoughtful and fun to be with. Making a difference in their lives by mentoring them as they travel on their religious journey is about as rewarding as it gets. The RE committee has committed to providing more support to the teaching teams through the use of weekly feedback from teachers that will be shared with their colleagues. The committee also needs more members. We meet on most months on the second Sunday of the month at 9:00 am in room 212. In addition to the monthly meetings, committee members help out in classrooms and with special events such as the pageant, games nights and barn dance.

RESOUNDING "YES" FOR THE DECLARATION OF CONSCIENCE

Promising to become bigger, bolder and better in the social justice arena is what UUCLV Trustees did in July by approving the Declaration of Conscience for the entire congregation. Trustees expressed hope that it becomes a guide post for continuing UUCLV social action.

"It's absolutely important for the life of the Church and for the world community," said Board President Cease Blocker. Board members expressed support for the work of the Social Action Committee, which has been engaged in promoting justice issues over many decades. While individuals in the congregation have personally signed the document (on line), Board approval is a vote of confidence in the justice work of the UUA, the Service Committee and the UUCLV Social Action Committee. Trustee Diana Lormand, whose daughter, Taneisha, voted as a teen Board representative, said, "As both Board Trustee and concerned citizen, I'm enthused to support the Declaration of Conscience. Not only does the statement confirm our beliefs, but declares our persistent commitment to action. In these days we live in, it can be overwhelming to decide where to focus our energy, but by joining forces with our fellow UU's, community organizations, other faiths, and individuals, we can and must make a difference in these areas. We, as the Board, have full confidence in the Social Action Committee and its plans to join efforts with other community members to make a lasting impact here in the Lehigh Valley, and subsequently, beyond!"

The UUA and the UU Service Committee both advocate "translating our values into action as we stand on the side of love with the most vulnerable among us." The Declaration affirms a commitment to "justice, equity and compassion, to truth and core values of American society". The statement responds to a growing hostility on the national scene toward immigrants, Muslims, people of color and the LGBTQ community. The Social Action Committee is asking individuals to sign on and become more engaged in speaking up for the disadvantaged. A national conference call was held July 14th on connecting with others working on social justice projects in their communities.

REPORT FROM THE REFUGEE SUPPORT COMMITTEE

MARCH 7, 2016: The Almawas family arrives.

- An apartment has been found and set up with necessary furniture and equipment;
- A six-person Syrian farm family arrives speaking no English and with no resources;
- Committees go into action helping them solve issues ranging from medical evaluations, to signing up for governmental services, to obtaining proper clothing;
- The three boys are signed up for a neighborhood Allentown elementary school after two months of intensive tutoring.

MAY 2017

- The three boys have progressed academically, but the social climate of the school is difficult;
- The boys were accepted at the Circle of Seasons charter school and began classes. They are now fluent in English;
- Kattab has a full-time factory job but is looking for something better. His lack of fluency in English is an impediment, but he is beginning to sound out words. He is ready to take his test for a driver's license;
- Dibe has made a little progress in English but is much more independent and now walks by herself to doctor's appointments. Her baby is due in August.

JULY 2017

- The search is on for a bigger apartment;
- There is an intense effort to make the family more independent;
- The final reports from the school show that all three boys have made tremendous progress. Both Ahmad and Mohammed are reading at grade level. Ghannam is only a little more than a year behind.
- They love their new school;
- Tutoring will now be reduced to just the adults because the children will be in school all day;
- People continue to provide recreational activities especially for the children. These include swimming, plays and concerts and other physical activities;
- The boys are in a summer parks program and, thanks to a generous UU donor, are attending the LePoCo peace camp.
