December: What Does It Mean to Be a People of Hope?

It's not always easy to hear well this time of year, especially when it comes to hope. The dominant messages are about hope offering us calm: "The light will come." "A new day is on its way." "Justice and joy are growing in the womb and will soon be born." Hope, from this point of view, is a voice that reassures. It's a welcomed whisper that says, "Yes, the sky may be dark now. Yes, the road you're on at this moment may be hard. But trust me, just over that horizon, there's a new world waiting for us all."

This soothing message comes to us as a gift. During dark days, we all get tired. The fruits of our efforts are hard to see. We feel alone. The promise that things will change offers us relief. We are released from the burden of believing that "it is all up to me" or that it all must be solved now. It's a beautiful and needed message. But it's also only half of what hope is trying to say. Hope doesn't just whisper "It will be different," it also shouts "It should be different" and "It can be different." Yes, it speaks soothing words about trusting and waiting, but it also takes the form of a holy impatience that declares, "Enough is enough. The time is now!" Hope is not just that which calms the unquiet heart; it also is the unquiet heart.

In other words, hope doesn't just promise us that change will come in the future; it also changes who we are in the present. When we believe that a new day is dawning, we don't just sit down and wait. We get up and go out to meet the light. When hope convinces us that there are unseen forces working for the good, we begin to look around more closely, and in doing so we notice that darkness and pain are not all that is there. When hope's holy impatience gets into our bones, we start acting as if we deserve that new day now. Which in turn changes others by convincing them that we all have waited long enough.

Bottom line: listening fully to hope, makes you dangerous, not just soothed! It doesn't relieve us of duty as much as it reminds us that wind is at our back and unseen reinforcements are at our side. Yes, hope reassures, but it also emboldens. It doesn't just offer us a promise; it gives us a push.

But all of this only happens if we listen fully. So maybe the most important question this month is: "Are we listening to everything hope has to say?"

WELCOME

Hi all.

Again, I've turned to the book "The Growing Church" and the chapter on welcoming. Everyone interested in our church should read it. In my mind, the key to our success is how we meet and

absorb new people into our congregation.

The fundamental question in the minds and hearts of visitors is not "Do I agree with these people". The question is "Are these my people". Visitors want to know if there is a place for them, if they will feel accepted, if they can forge deep friendships, will their children be safe and taught values of love and understanding and if we are really active in improving the community.

We must begin by opening our hearts to their needs and the pain of their isolation. We must reach out. To ignore the visitor is not bad manners. It's immoral.

Over the past few weeks, I've asked a few congregants how they feel about our church. Generally it's more positive than negative but in the past two weeks, I've heard from three newer people that some long time members would not respond to even a "good morning". They seem to be too much into themselves. This is very unfortunate. "Don't bother me, I have more important things to do than talk to you". You can imagine how that might come across to a visitor. One friend said he hasn't joined the church because he hasn't felt welcome even though he believes in the principles of our denomination.

My real concern is that if we don't work towards growth, we will slowly die. We can't let that happen. When I first came here in 1994, we had well over 200 members. Now we are a little less than 200.We have to work to stop this slow slide.

Please welcome all visitors from your heart. And, as I've noted before, join a committee and have some fun.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE) FOR CHILDREN & YOUTH

Greetings! December is a mid-term break for schools and colleges and is also the case for the primary and lower elementary grade RE classes. Here's the rundown:
